#### 10 Overview and aims

Students will study and produce writing in different genres, gaining knowledge of craft issues and learning to apply them to many different forms. The aims of the module are to:

- Study and participate in the practice of writing, with particular focus on the breadth of genre
- Develop narrative and lyrical skills appropriate to particular genres.
- Produce and rework samples of writing in specialist areas.

- Develop skills of editing, rewriting and critique of work-in-progress.
- Study techniques appropriate to a wide range of genres.
- Learn to apply their critical and editing skills to the creative work of others

#### 11 Module content

Students will also develop independent learning strategies in relation to researching and drafting their own creative work. They will develop the ability to work in groups, to use information resources effectively, and to contribute confidently to both whole class and small group workshops. They will learn to workshop in small groups, offering and receiving constructive feedback. They will learn how to apply their editing and creative skills to commercial work, developing contacts and making use of NTU links to local media, for whom they will write reviews for potential publication. From year to year a selection from the following areas will be offered:
