10 Overview and aims

This is an optional module at level 2. Students study poetry and poetry anthologies, with the aim of improving their knowledge of poetry, and of developing skills in critical evaluation of poetry, in editing, and in book-construction. The distinctive element of this module is that in the second-half of the module students, working in groups, produce their own sample anthology. The lecture programme begins in unit 1 by introducing the theoretical and knowledge-based framework of the module, and continues with specific sessions on, for example, textual analysis of poetry, on

comparative critique of texts, on evaluating past anthologies, and, in unit 2, on editing and preparing texts for inclusion in an anthology. In unit 2, students are directed towards considering the structure and scholarly apparatus of an anthology before producing the final version.

Aims:

- Develop the knowledge base from which an anthology might be produced.
- Develop skills in textual analysis of poetry.
- Refine the processes of negotiation and co-operation that are essential to effective group work. This develops independence of learning as well as negotiating skills to managed group work effectively, thus enhancing employability. Each student must adapt elements of the learning process to support other members of their group. Qualities of empathy and personalisation are key here.
- Develop expertise in the use of library and information resources. Development of digital competencies and IT skills in order to enhance employability.
- Refine editorial skills.

Develop presentational skills necessary to deliver a presentation to a group of peers.

Group and individual feedback ensures personalised targets and goal setting for future development.

• Develop confidence and skills in communicating ideas and in producing a text. This kind of competence is greatly in demand by employers seeking to secure the services of employees who are independent and good communicators.

11 Module content

The contents of the curriculum will be based on the close study of poetry. In the first unit, in the programme of lectures and seminar/workshops, students will build on their close-reading and critical skills. In the second unit, students will be taught further theoretical concerns specific to the editing and scholarly presentation of texts. Students will be guided in applying the skills and knowledge already learnt as they work in groups constructing a critical anthology of their own, and they will be invited to reflect on the processes involved in group work as they work towards the final versions of the anthologies they have chosen to compile. There is an emphasis on managing each other's competencies in order to best serve the group and the

capacity to encourage one another is a highly desirable quality in the workplace.
