10 Overview and aims

This core German language module aims to build on the German Language One module, developing further fluency and accuracy in the spoken and written language. It further develops the four language learning skills and other transferable skills, through tasks such as video analysis, summaries and translations, oral debates and presentations. The module will be organised around the discussion of issues in the contemporary German-speaking countries. For those students going abroad, there will be preparation, both practical and linguistic, for extended residence in the German-speaking countries. This module also aims to provide students with the opportunity to engage in professional skills development through exposure to simulated work-like projects within the German-speaking world. The opportunities offered to students to actively engage in work-like projects will enable them to reflect upon their experience within work-like simulated scenarios as an important step within their career development.

11	Module content
<p>The module focuses on developing both your understanding of key issues in contemporary German-speaking culture and society and your key communicative skills in German: listening, speaking, reading, writing. The module is therefore designed to reinforce your language learning and communication skills by encouraging you to engage with material in a range of media (written, electronic, audio-visual), consolidating your grammatical knowledge, and enabling you to participate actively in whole class, small group and paired discussions in German. There will be a focussed block within the module dedicated to a simulated work-like project. This will take the form of a group activity, supervised by the module tutor, in which students work to a simulated employer's brief provided by the module team. These briefs could take the form of the translation of a website of a company, hotel, or sports club, or researching and producing an English-language summary of the coverage in the German-speaking press of an agreed current affairs topic.</p>
