#### 10 Overview and aims

This core module builds on the previous years of language learning by aiming to maximise your fluency and accuracy in written and oral/aural German. Throughout the module, you will combine analysis of important contemporary issues in German society with further development of your communicative skills to enable you to reach a high level of language proficiency.

This module will accordingly enable you to operate effectively in academic, professional and social contexts, develop high level critical and analytical skills, and apply linguistic and socio-cultural awareness and research skills to the analysis of contemporary written and aural documents.

### 11 Module content

This module aims to develop your knowledge, understanding and proficiency in German through the study of key questions in German current affairs. Study and discussion of these issues encourages you to analyse, synthesise and respond to relevant written and audiovisual documents, developing your skills through language-

learning tasks such as translations, summaries, essays, written and aural comprehensions, presentations and debates. These may be undertaken in a variety of contexts, formal and informal, and be student or staff led. Language learning is underpinned by the reinforcement and further development of German grammar.
