10 Overview and aims

The module examines current theories and debates in the field of intercultural communication studies. The module explores communication across cultural boundaries and the impact this has on effective intercultural and interpersonal communication. The module focuses on the hidden dimensions of culture, rarely understood or examined in everyday life, and seeks to understand these theories in the light of your own lived experience. The module explores how you can be involved

in developing your awareness, knowledge, skills and strategies for effective interpersonal and intercultural communication.

In the module you will be:

- 1. Studying key concepts within the field of intercultural communication
- 2. Raising your awareness of the impact of communication on effective intercultural and interpersonal communication
- 3. Enhancing your ability to examine the hidden dimensions of culture in local and global events in a variety of cultural settings.
- 4. Developing your ability to contextualise your knowledge in the light of you own experiences.
- 5. Reflecting on your own and other's intercultural communicative competence to help you enhance your own intercultural communication skills.

11 Module content

The module will focus on a critical review of the key concepts within the field of intercultural communication studies. The module addresses issues directly associated with the impact of culture and communication in an intercultural context. This review will enable you to practice interpreting everyday cultural and intercultural experiences, events and issues at the local and global level. The general theme of the module is to engage with a discussion of the inter-relationship between culture, communication and intercultural communication. Through a combination of lectures, seminar activities and projects the topics covered will include themes such as culture and identity, ethnocentrism and stereotyping, acculturation, adaptation and culture learning, verbal and nonverbal communication, language, symbols and artefacts, the psychology of intercultural interaction and intercultural conflict resolution.
