10 **Overview and aims**

In this module, you will learn a range of practical skills for carrying out research in a global context. The primary goal is to prepare you to conduct independent research, and equips you with the skills needed for completing an in-country study project or dissertation in Global Studies, should you opt to do one.

The module prepares you for in-country study and research in a global context by:

- Familiarising you with a range of primary and secondary sources, including archival materials, TV and film, interviews and statistical data, and the skills to assess the relative value of various forms of evidence in relation to different research questions
- 2. Acquainting you with a variety of comparative and field based research approaches, including interviews, observations and ethnographies, textual

and visual analysis, survey research, and their appropriateness for gathering evidence to answer different kinds of questions

- 3. Developing your ability to identify and design effective research questions;
- 4. Equipping you with the skills to interpret everyday events, issues and experiences in diverse locations in relation to local, regional and global contexts
- 5. Guiding you to evaluate and reflect on the significance of the intercultural learning resulting from the work undertaken in another country
- Sensitising you to the challenges and opportunities of researching in an intercultural context, and the sorts of ethical issues involved in conducting research
- 7. Making you aware of the practical issues involved in studying and researching in other countries

11 Module content

The module develops around a series of local case studies each with the twin objective of a) introducing you to a particular method or type of evidence, and b) enabling you to practice the interpretation of everyday experiences, events and issues in relation to local, regional and global processes. Through a combination of workshops, mini-projects and practicals the module will cover: designing project and writing research questions; working with ethnography, interviews, archival research, documentary evidence and textual analysis; comparing and evaluating different forms of evidence, primary and secondary data; theory and method; fieldnote diaries, reflective writing and intercultural learning ; health and safety and ethics in research.
