### 10 Overview and aims

Since the events of September 11th 2001, the way we study and respond to conflict and violence has changed significantly. It is no longer sufficient to focus solely on inter-state conflicts. The aim of this module is to understand violence as part of a set of problems relating to globalisation. At the heart of the module is a search for different kinds of knowledge which might help better understand the main dilemmas of violence in the contemporary world, as they are experienced at the local and global levels.

We begin the module by asking a question which will keep coming back to concern us: how (if at all) has conflict and violence changed in the recent past? There are

widespread claims that we now live in an age of cyberwar, postmodern war, ethnic and religious wars, or conflict and violence, rather than 'old fashioned' war. We explore discourses of violence via global media sources, such as film, news reporting, television and magazines. We aim to understand how these are interpreted in local contexts and their impacts on cycles of violence and/or conflict resolution at both the local and global level. We engage with theories related to geopolitics, cultural identity, empowerment and emancipation.

The key aims of the module

- To provide critical understandings of contemporary approaches to violence and conflict
- To explore key concepts in critical Global Studies
- To critically reflect on how 20<sup>th</sup>/21st century conflicts have been shaped and influenced by concepts and theories.
- To assess the relationships between texts, culture, identity politics and contemporary violence.
- To critically evaluate the historical and contemporary relationships between knowledge, representation and conflict.
