10 Overview and aims

The module serves to acquaint you with the key skills and practices required to undertake and complete independent project research in history. It introduces you to engagement with and interrogation of primary source research materials and datasets, and prepares you for more critical reading of the key themes and secondary debates concerning historical argument. You will gain experience in understanding source evidence, data manipulation and working with textual and non-textual archives. There is also valuable discussion on writing a literature review, constructing and contextualising a research thesis, annotating bibliographies, and looking ahead to writing a dissertation.

You are assessed on a 3,000 word Project Proposal. The Proposal aims to consolidate the research skills acquired in the module by requiring completion of a formal application for project research to be approved by a potential dissertation supervisor.
