10 Overview and aims

Conflict and Cultures examines a seminal period in modern English history and introduces students to a range of interpretations of the nature of English society in the years 1850-1880. Much of it focuses on a period which has been interpreted as an 'age of equipoise': a time of relative stabilisation in society, politics and culture after decades of turbulence and disorder. The module will critically engage with this notion and offer students the opportunity to develop a rigorous understanding of this period and its interpretation.

The module will build on your experiences at level 1 history by helping you to more deeply engage with historical debate and handle primary sources of greater detail and complexity. Assessments will focus on helping you to develop your academic skills in areas such as: interpreting primary sources and advancing research skills; critically evaluating historian's interpretations and utilising them in arguments; academic writing and presentation; debating with your peers; understanding concepts and the relationship between history and other academic disciplines.

11 Module content

The module offers a range of topics, selected to provide you with a structured overview of the period while introducing you to important case studies in social and cultural relations and change. Areas of study include:
