It also analyses the way in which such events were reflected upon in the visual arts, literature and cinema. The module seeks to enable you to understand issues in contemporary Italian history and culture, and provide you with an adequate grounding to selected areas of specialisation in preparation for your stay in Italy during your year abroad

11 Module content

The module will address central themes relevant to an understanding of contemporary Italy. They include: regionalism and its political and linguistic implications; the North-South divide and the *questione meridionale*; the years of terrorism; the influence of the Church on Italian politics and society; the Mafia. The module looks closely at literary texts and films dealing with some of the major issues, namely the *questione meridionale*, the years of terrorism and the mafia. The module is taught partly in Italian.
