10 Overview and aims

This Core module will introduce students to a range of methods of data collection, project design and data analysis. Students who attend all sessions, and can demonstrate the learning outcomes, will acquire the skills and methods which will sustain them in preparing for the 3rd Year Dissertation or Capstone requirement. At the end of the module, students will be able to design a research project that they may wish to do in their 3rd year, and write a research proposal for assessment and feedback. Students may elect to design a project in any area of Linguistics of interest to them.

The aims of the module are:

- To provide students with approaches, theoretical frameworks and practical skills for linguistic description and analysis applied in project work
- To engage students in the process of linguistic investigation, including data collection, the nature of linguistic evidence and research methodologies
- To encourage students to apply appropriate linguistic theories to data collected in real-life situations.
