#### 10 Overview and aims

This module examines the meaning of Europe as a historical, geographical, political and cultural entity, and explores questions concerning European identity. We engage with debates such as Where is Europe? Is there a common European culture and heritage? Can we talk of a 'European identity'? How does it relate to national identities? How has the idea of Europe changed over time? How does it relate to a series of 'others', such as Islam, or the United States?

The module therefore aims to introduce you to ideas and ideologies about Europe and Europeanness, to the historical, social and political forces that have shaped European internal and external dynamics, and serves as the basis for further study of the interdisciplinary discourses about social relations and practices in and across Europe. It begins by situating the idea of Europe geographically and historically. It then explores the development of Europe, looking typically at such issues the formation of nation states in Europe and the relationship between nationalism and common European heritage; the relationship between Europe and its 'Others', such as the United States and Islam. The module then focuses on key developments in European integration. It asks how and why the European Union emerged and developed; how it works, why it matters and how it affects our lives.

# 11 Module content

This module will begin by situating the idea of Europe geographically and historically. It then explores the development of Europe, looking typically at such issues as the role of religion in European identity; the formation of nation states in Europe and the relationship between nationalism and common European heritage; the relationship between Europe and its 'Others', such as the United States and Islam. This module introduces the main historical processes which have prompted and sustained the construction of the European Union, and the core institutional framework of the European Union. It therefore focuses on the role and significance of institutions (such as the Parliament, the Council, the Court and the Commission), and introduces academic and policy debates around key policy issues (such as the single market and currency, the Common Agricultural Policy, the democratic deficit, the Common Foreign and Security Policy, EU citizenship, enlargement, and the Constitution).
