### 10 Overview and aims

#### Overview

This module provides an introduction to a range of non-Hollywood, international cinemas. Cinemas typically covered include European, Asian and African ones as well as other world cinemas. The module will look carefully at films in terms of close analysis and issues like genre and auteurism, but it will also locate cinema in the broader industrial and socio-historical context. Complementing Reading the Screen with its introduction to film and television studies, this module will give students a growing awareness of the diversity of international cinema both in terms of its own stylistic choices but also in relation to the contexts to which it responds.

### **Aims**

1. To give students a developing awareness of the formal and industrial diversity of international cinemas.
2. To develop students' understanding of the internal diversity of national and regional cinemas, particularly but not only in relation to the art-house / popular divide.
3. To lead students to question the often Hollywood-centred approach to key concepts such as genre or stardom.
4. To encourage students to explore the relationship between film and broader socio-historical contexts both in the contemporary period and at earlier times.
5. To consider the question of the applicability of certain concepts (e.g. Modernism, post-modernism) to a range of international cinemas.

### **11 Module content**

The module's content will typically include topics such as the following as they relate to European, Asian, African or other world cinemas:

1. Realisms and neo-realism
2. New Waves
3. Cinema and Modernity, modernisms and postmodernism
4. Decolonisation and post-independence experiences
5. The popular and the art-house (in relation to figures such as the auteur, genres and stars)
6. The national and the transnational
7. Cinema and the avant-garde
