10 **Overview and aims**

This module provides students with the fundamental tools they need for studying any aspect of language. We consider the systems that combine to form language at a structural level: sounds, word and sentence structure, as well as the mechanics of meaning-making in language (semantics and pragmatics). As well as considering questions of language structure, this module also showcases how these linguistic tools can be applied to, for example, dictionary-making, analysing the power of linguistic persuasion in the news, internet trolling and the study of speech disorders. This module is a Core Module for Joint Honours students, and a prerequisite for taking Linguistics modules at Level 2 and Level 3.

There is subject-specific employability material dispersed across both core modules in Level 1 (making up 5 credits of subject specific employability related material) to allow students to engage with the importance of their Linguistics studies in their future career. This includes the discussion of clinical approaches in as well as the application of discourse analysis. The two core modules in Level 1 have been re-designed to enhance student understanding of Linguistics issues and support both their theoretical knowledge and these applications in other scenarios.
