10 Overview and aims

The world around us is organised and structured by signs, symbols, text and images. These give meaning to the world but also create limits and hierarchies that control and define us as well as segregating and excluding.

There is a strong tradition within French thought and culture of pushing the limits of representation in order to produce new meanings and ways of looking at the world, ourselves and each other. This tradition has been enormously important in both critiquing and shaping a number of global cultural practices used in politics, advertising, marketing, journalism, museum and art curation as well as in science, medicine where there is a need to present complex information to different end users and in engineering and architecture where there is a demand to reconcile aesthetics with functionality.

This course will focus on some more recent (20th and 21st Centuries) examples of this tradition. We will look at examples from art, architecture, photography, literature, poetry, film and graphic novels. We will think about the different ways text and image are combined in the form of signs, advertising, maps, calendars, buildings etc., and how the relationship between these two forms of representation are in constant negotiation. We will also interrogate the relevance of French literary and aesthetic theory for engaging with important contemporary debates around media representation, citizenship and the environment.
