10 Overview and aims

This module builds on the first level 2 module in Spanish (Spanish language 3). The module aims to:

- Further develop fluency and accuracy in the spoken and written language
- Consolidate and further develop your knowledge of Spanish grammar
- Introduce a wider range of registers and varieties of the language
- Analyse written and audio-visual texts in more depth
- Prepare you, practically and culturally, for extended residence in Spain
- Provide students with the opportunity to engage in professional skills through exposure to simulated work-like projects within the Spanish-speaking world.

11 Module content

A number of written and audio-visual texts will be analysed including extracts from Spanish television and journalistic articles. Aspects of Spanish morphology and syntax taught at level 1 will be revised and new areas of grammar introduced. Training will be given in presentation skills in Spanish. There will be small group and paired discussions in both formal and informal contexts. There will be a focussed block dedicated to a simulated work-like project. This will take the form of group activity, supervised by the module tutor, in which students work to a simulated employer's brief provided by the module team such as the translation of a website of a company, hotel, sports club or researching and producing an English-language

summary of the coverage in the target-language press of an agreed current affairs topic.
