10 Overview and Aims

To provide an opportunity for sustained investigation and analysis of a specific topic of the student's choice (with guidance). The topic must be relevant to the field of study of International Relations, but can be theoretical or empirical in nature.

A synoptic assessment is also contained within the dissertation module. It will require you to reflect on the entirety of your degree at NTU, including both subjects as part of a Joint Honours award. The synoptic assessment allows you to combine learning in relation to your employability from a range of activities and experiences.

- 1. Introductory session on aims and objectives
- 2. Submission of 2000 word literature review by the end of term one.
- 3. Refresher classes and workshops, in which students discuss practical issues relating to their proposals, e.g. using data sets, conducting interviews or focus groups, analysing texts, analytical frameworks.
- 4. Synoptic Assessment: A reflection across the whole of your degree at NTU in relation to your employability
- 5. Other content varies according to topic chosen through individual supervisions
